

LIBERAL DEMOCRATS KEEP COUNCIL OFFICES CLOSED!



Have you ever tried contacting Mole Valley Council Officers either in person or by telephone?

Now it's more difficult following the Liberal Democrats' decision to close the offices from 2.30pm every day, allowing the majority of staff to work from home three days a week!

Your telephone calls are now dealt with by the Customer Services Team who will pass on messages to other Officers, with residents having to wait for a response days later.

This is an appalling situation and is no way to run a Council. It is inefficient, costly and causes needless delay and frustration for residents. At the recent Full Council, I requested that Council offices remain open till 5pm every day and that Council staff return to working in the office five days a week. These requests were refused by the Liberal Democrats saying that residents can contact the Council digitally!

This is not inclusive and totally ignores all those people who are not comfortable with, or unable to use, technology. It also fails those who have complex or sensitive queries that require face to face contact.

Ashtead Independents believe that everyone should be treated equally have the easiest access to the full range of Council services and information. We will continue to pursue this matter.

PROTECTING OUR COMMUNITIES - PARKING & ENFORCEMENT

Surrey Highways are way behind establishing yellow lines to protect our school children in Ashtead - due last May/June.

I have been chasing this for months, but I am sorry to say the same excuse is being given. Parking Enforcement has been taken away from the Districts and is being done by a Company under contract to Surrey County Council.

I have asked for the details of when enforcement officers have visited Ashtead, particularly to protect our schools, but have yet to receive a reply.

On a more positive note the 20mph limit around schools is currently being implemented around The Greville with consultation going on for the area around Downsend/St Andrews/St Peters and West Ashtead.

The road humps in both Woodfield Lane and Barnett Wood Lane are being assessed for improvement in relation to issues such as noise, and this, once costed and approved, could well be implemented during 2024.

More Improvements to Ashtead Pond

I am pleased to report that Ashtead Pond has undergone a remarkable transformation thanks to the dredging and the pruning of the trees and plants around it. It has been a long process, but we are finally seeing the results of restoring the pond to its former glory.

For too long, the pond was neglected and obscured by overgrown vegetation and silt. The intention was to protect the water from road pollution, but the lack of maintenance and funding led to a dismal

situation. The water level dropped, the wildlife suffered, and the public could not enjoy the beauty of the pond.

Fortunately, the Council took action and removed a total of 330 tons of silt in two phases. They also trimmed and removed some of the trees that were blocking the light and consuming too much water. The pond is now deeper, clearer, and more inviting. The birds and other animals can thrive in their natural habitat, and people can appreciate the view and relax by the water.

Decision on Artificial Football Pitch Goes into Extra Time

The Liberal Democrat Cabinet at Mole Valley District Council agreed that the planned fencedoff artificial football pitch in Ashtead QEII recreation ground should go forward to the next stages. However, the Cabinet's decision was reached despite earlier opposition from Ashtead Independent members of the Scrutiny Committee. including chairman David Hawksworth. As it felt its concerns were not adequately addressed, the Scrutiny Committee called in the decision for re-examination on the 14th November. It will report back to the Cabinet on the 28th November.

The Scrutiny Committee's concerns primarily focused on the threat to the openness of the area, the use of plastics, and loss of public open space, as opposed to possible benefits it could bring to young people's access to all weather football facilities. There were further concerns over the consultation process and that the new facility was to be managed by a company established for that purpose and independent from Ashtead Football Club.

Despite concerns, the Lib Dem Cabinet decided to still proceed with the decision.

Several matters still remain to be progressed

before any works could be permitted to start including approval to divert the route of the existing public right of way footpath, consent from Fields in Trust, and advertising the loss of public open space.

A New £13.7m Cycle Corridor for Ashtead?

Liberal Democrats at Mole Valley District Council are spending $\pounds 160,000$ for more designs for the district's new $\pounds 13.7m$ bike and pedestrian routes.

The two routes under consideration are the northern route connecting Leatherhead with Epsom and a route between Leatherhead and Great Bookham. These are a part of the Surrey County Council's Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Project.

The route through Ashtead along Barnett Wood Lane and Craddocks Avenue would involve a mixture of shared pavements, one-way and two-way tracks, carriageway widening,

verge narrowing, junction modification, and new crossings (two with Toucan lights). There are also suggestions to widen the routes across the Woodfield to the Railway Station and through the Ashtead Recreation Ground to allow mixed usage.

Given the failure of the southern Leatherhead to Epsom route along the A24 to attract significant numbers of cyclists, the newish Ashtead Route has been opposed by Ashtead Independent Councillors. It is surprising then that this next stage is proceeding without any public consultation or hard evidence of possible usage (other than some modelling).

The 'Local Cycling and Walking Plan' is available on the Mole Valley District Council website; keep an eye out for the eventual public consultation!

Ashtead Park Volunteer Group

It is a shame that our first volunteer day of the season had to be cancelled but we will be having another one soon and I will keep people informed on our website and on social media.

There is still a huge amount of clearance work needed in the park because it is just that – a park. The estate did not have a great deal of natural woodland and, although there are some lovely specimen very old oaks, many of the older trees were planted by the owners of Ashtead Park House, now the City of London Freemen's School. These include some alien specimens such as the Yellow Buckeye (*Aesculus flava*) from America and the Caucasian Elm (*Zelkova carpinifolia*).

Volunteers are trying to remove the encroaching bramble, scrub, and thousands of saplings that are taking over the open spaces. The Park has been neglected for a long time and even the notice boards are decrepit and out of date. The dead hedge did manage to divert people to the preferred path, but it is now unsightly and will be removed.

Some carefully targeted work on trees with ash dieback has been carried out and only ones that are far gone have been removed. The rest of the ash trees will continue to be monitored. Also, some money has been found to replace the signage and the information will be updated.

Along with the Leatherhead Angling Club which has a licence to fish the pond, the Council is aiming to improve the areas around the pond and, hopefully, the recently installed plastic piping and netting will be concealed, or removed appropriately. It is all 'work in progress' and anyone who would like to volunteer is welcome to give their details to Councillors so that they can be assured of being kept up to date.

Mists, Mellow Fruitfulness, and Bonfires

It's that time of the year again and the air will be full of acrid smoke from bonfires and fireworks. I make no secret of the fact that I hate both - bonfires because of their toxic fumes and particulates, and fireworks because they are noisy, and terrify pets and wildlife.

Thankfully, we have fewer bonfires in Ashtead than 43 years ago when I arrived, and when some people burned even their domestic rubbish. Luckily, most now realise that wood smoke is highly toxic. Smoke from tobacco is just one plant species that is carcinogenic. Think of all the species in garden rubbish, and be aware that many carcinogenic and toxic compounds are released in its smoke just look up 'toxins in woodsmoke' online.

The people who suffer most are those with chest ailments, and any kind of smoke will exacerbate their discomfort and ill health. But woodsmoke is harmful to healthy people, even if they like the smell of it, or they find it difficult to believe.

Compost your garden waste as much as possible, take it to the Council Waste Centre in Randall's Road, or use the garden waste bins for collection. These are provided by the Council for a fee. If you need more information, the Council's website will give full details.

If a neighbour's bonfire is a nuisance, report it directly to the Environmental Health Team at MVDC: they have the authority to act as appropriate.
